GRANT RECEIVES AWARD

Dr. Edward Donald Grant of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, was the recipient of his community's Golden Deeds Award for 1978. The honor was presented to acknowledge Dr. Grant's many years of public service to the state of Louisiana and the city of Baton Rouge.

Dr. Grant came to the United States from Scotland as a boy of eleven, in the year 1909. Accompanied by his older brother, the pair found their way to Texas where they lived with an aunt. Dr. Grant attended Austin College, earned a commission in the Army, and became an American citizen.


Many years later, in 1952, the Covernor of Louisiana, Robert Kennon, brought Grant to Baton Rouge to become Director of State Institutions, a job which encompassed the administration of the state's hospitals, correctional schools, and prisons. His six-year tenure in this job brought many reforms and improvements, and under his supervision, many positive "firsts" were accomplished for the underprivileged, the hospital and prison immates, and other minorities.

Leaving state administration in 1958, Dr. Grant entered the private sector to become President of Grant Chemicals, Chairman of the Board of the Grant-Lear Corporation, and an executive of Gramor Chemicals, Inc. As if his envolvement in these ventures were not enough to occupy his time, Dr. Grant continued to serve the Presbyterian Church as a Board Member for thirteen years, work eighteen years as Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education, and serve as Moderator of its highest council, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S., in 1962-63.

More recently, Dr. Grant has become involved in the organization, "Make Today Count" -- a group of people with cancer dedicating their time and efforts to helping others who are dealing with their common illness.

It is with a great deal of pride that we Americans of Scottish ancestry, can look to men such as Dr. Grant whose individual initiative, faith, and perseverence have been a credit to their heritage and their chosen home.


Lord Strathspey, in a recent letter, assures me that his book is coming along nicely. We all look forward to its publication soon. More details on this in upcoming issues!

THE GRANTS OF GLENMORISTON

The last issue of CRAIGELLACHIE contained an article on the development of the branch (or cadet) families of the Clan Grant. This edition will feature one of these branch families— The Grants of Glenmoriston.

Although directly descended from the original Lairds of Freuchie in Strathspey, the Glemmoriston branch of the family has remained independent and self-sustaining for 170 years.

The original barony of Glenmoriston included the glen and environs of the river named Moriston, and the area of its confluence with the famous Loch Ness. Today


this scenic and picturesque region is a favorite among tourists who enjoy trout and salmon fishing, and those who simply hope to catch a glimpse of the Loch Ness Monster. Regardless of personal motivation, Glenmoriston is one of the most beautiful and awesome areas in all the Highlands and a visit there will never be forgotten.

I am deeply indebted to my friend, James Ewen Grant, Laird of Glenmoristion, for furnishing me with a concise history of his family.

Tourist Information may be obtained by writing Glenmoriston Estates, Ltd. Invermoriston, Inverness-shire, Scotland. According to tradition, a boundary dispute between the Laird of Glenmoriston and his neighbor the MacDonnell of Glengarry was once settled by a wrestling match. Each clan sent its best wrestler to the contest which was held on the property in question. The Grant champion was victorious and the boundary was established to Glenmoriston's advantage. However, the results of the contest vary depending upon whose newspaper one reads.

Description of the Arms of Glenmoriston

SHIELD: Three gold antique crowns on a red background, separated by a silver fess with an azureblue sinister bendlet.

ABOVE: A helm befitting his degree with a red mantling doubled gold, and on a red chapeau is placed a rock enflamed proper, accompanied on either side by a branch of Scot's fir.

MOTTO: "Creag Nan Eun"


SUPPORTERS: Dexter, a Scottish deerhound; and, Sinister, a raven, both gorged with an antique gold crown.

Glenmoriston

THE LAIRDS OF GLENMORISTON



On December 8, 1509, John, 2nd Laird of Freuchie, and two of his sons received crown charters for lands in the county of Inverness, from King James IV. The barony of Urquhart was added to the holdings of the Laird of Freuchie, while Corriemony was awarded to his son, John. At the same time, "Iain Mor" Grant (also known as John Grant of Culcabock in view of other properties he held) received the lands and barony of Glemmoriston for himself and heirs-male. With this charter, Iain Mor became the founder of the family of Glemmoriston.

Today, 470 years later, James Ewen Grant, Baron and 14th Laird of Glenmoriston, is the direct lineal descendant of Iain Mor. Glenmoriston Estate Office, established in 1934, manages much of the original territory granted in the charter of 1509.

According to family histories, Iain Mor and the early Lairds were men of great physical size and strength. The following traditional anecdote furnished by the present Laird documents this idea:

During a visit to the King at Holyrood, Edinburgh, the 3rd Laird was prompted to accept the challenge of an English champion whose particularly insulting remarks were aimed at anyone who was brave enough to answer his dare. "Tain Mor a Chaistel", as the Laird was called, offered the Englishman his hand, and evidently his grip was so powerful, he broke the hand of the bully and ended his bragging—much to the astonishment and delight of the spectators.

In the latter stages of the 17th century and in the Jacobite Rebellions of 1715 and 17h5, the Grants of Glenmoriston supported the Stuart's attempts at restoration, generally alligning themselves with their neighbors, the Glengarry MacDonnells. In these forlorn campaigns, the family suffered much at the hands of the government troops, having their homes

"WHEN TIMES WERE ROTTEN"

A Report by Seumas Mor Grant, Director of the Speyside Institute for Non-Essential Studies (S.I.K.S.)

It has been noted many times that whenever Scots meet, whether at Clan Gatherings, or in one-to-one blathering fests, there exists among them an unique cordiality, unlike anything experienced by any other group of people. In making their inquiry into this phenomenon, the S.I.N.S. researchers found that Scottish inter-relationships were not always characterized by peace and joy, but at times got down-right "kinky".

During the 14th Century, the Scots had just fought a war of independence, and with the exception of a little bad blood between the Highlanders and Lowlanders, things were pretty good. Nevertheless, in keeping with the inexorable destiny of man, Robert "bought the farm" in 1329. That is when things began to get rotten.

Robert was succeeded by several flakey kings who did not know from zilch about "kinging". Soon, mischief became the national pastime which developed rapidly into world-class vandalism for those who would train hard. One of the worst was one king's own son, Alexander, Earl

of Buchan, known as the "Wolf of Badenoch". He was called Wolf -- not for hanging out at the drive-in, whistling at girls, but for sacking the towns of Elgin and Forres. He also burned the Cathedral of Moray which was definitely a big fat No-No. The Cathedral was not your ordinary-Sunday-Co-To-Meeting Church. To the Clergy it was to bingo what wimbledon is to tennis.

As a father Alex was no prize winner either. He taught his son the manly art of pillaging at an early age. With other vandals, he plundered Glenisla, sending the local Sheriff to boot-hill with a spear through his spleen. A Latin scholar who witnessed the killing was heard to say, "Sic pilum iactum eat," or words to that effect.

After too many years of evil and crime, clan chiefs finally gave this type of entertainment an "R" rating and decided to close the show. They decided to round up all the miscreants, read them their rights, string them up, and if that didn't work,... they would try something drastic. As a consequence, one morning in 1434, Sir Duncan of Freuchie got up, donned his kilt, argyles, and hush-puppies, kissed his lady "good-bye" and said, "I'm off to Craigellachie, and I won't be back until things get better!" From that day on things around Strathspey began to get better.

Addendum: S.I.N.S. realizes that some readers might find this report difficult to believe. They are reminded that the thrust of the investigation was on the Scot's cordiality—— not their veracity. One definitive fact was revealed however. The literal translation of "Sic pilum iactum est", is "Thus the spear is thrown," or as more freely translated by an ancient Roman policeman, "That's why a cop is never around when you need one!"

"Touch Not the Kitty ... "

Whisky Cake *

One cup raisins
One and one-third cup water
One-half cup butter
Three-fourths cup brown sugar
One egg
Two tablespoons whisky (Glen Fiddich or Grant's)
One and one-half cup all-purpose flour
One teaspoon bicarbonate of soda
One-fourth teaspoon salt
One-half teaspoon nutmeg
One tablespoon lemon juice
Two and one-half ounces finely chopped walnuts



Simmer raisins in water for 15 minutes. Cream the butter and sugar in another bowl. Beat in the egg. Stir in the flour, bicarbonate of soda, salt, and nutmeg, with about two tablespoons of liquid from the raisins. Stir in raisins (drained), lemon juice, walnuts, and whisky. Pour into two prepared cake tins and bake for thirty minutes at 350 degrees.

Icing

One-fourth cup butter One cup confectioners sugar Two tablespoons lemon juice One teaspoon whisky

Cream butter and sugar until smooth. Add the lemon and whisky and beat until smooth. Ice when cake cools.


