Spring 2010

Well, it looks like most of us have survived the winter. This winter has been particularly brutal for many of us in the Eastern US and those of us on the West Coast have experienced the wet version of the East Coast winter. As we move into Spring, a time of fresh beginnings, the Clan Grant Society (CGS) is also moving into fresh beginnings.

Last year saw a period of upheaval and uncertainty within the Society. Several vacant positions required the premature election of a new President, Vice-President, and Board Member-at-Large. We gained a new genealogist and a new Quartermaster. Jean Grant Wilson, dedicated membership secretary and one of the matriarchs of the Clan Grant Society, had to step down from her position to care for family. Thank you for all that you have done for us in the past and we trust you will still be an active presence in our family. We fortunately have an able-bodied replacement in the guise of Gail Grant of Perris, California. Things are settling down into some manner of organization now. The Board of Directors work well together and we are making progress on new things for the Society.

Vice President Steve Grant has taken the reins with polishing up the Officers Handbook. This document, a greatly-enhanced version of the earlier Commissioner's Handbook, will be released directly to the elected and appointed officers, and will be available online to all members. This document outlines the duties of all of the elected and appointed officers of the CGS. This document will be modified and refined as duties of the officers change or become better defined. It will also serve as a reference guide for members who wish to become more active in the CGS but are unsure of what the duties of the various offices entail.

We are about ready to upgrade the CGS website to allow for more functionality. There will be a public site and a members-only site where members can view past issues of the Craigellachie, view CGS documents such as the Officers Handbook, as well as other features still in the development phase.

We have talked about making the CGS a 501(c)3 organization for several years now. This would allow all officers to deduct their expenses directly related to CGS activities and would allow people to make tax deductible donations to the CGS. We hope to get started on the application process later this month. The Clan Grant will

be hosting its International Gathering of the Grants this August 14-21 in the land of the Grants, the Strathspey Valley. The CGS UK has put together a fairly extensive program, including the Abernethy Games in Nethybridge, golf, history seminars, a trip to Culloden, a trip to Fort George at the south end of Loch Ness, a day trip to Inverness, a visit to the Glen Grant Whisky Distillery, dinner ride on the Strathspey Steam Railway, a trip to Elgin, a banquet, and even a hike up THE Craigelachie in Aviemore. Principle Chief of the Cherokee Nation, Chad "Corntassle" Smith, direct descendant of Ludovick Grant, Younger of Creiche, will be leading a delegation from the Cherokee Nation at the Nethybridge Games. 

I'm sorry to have so much bad news. For those of us who did attend, we had a great time renewing friendships. Some of us only see each other once a year. The parade of clans was bigger this year with a unit from the United States Army participating from Schofield Barracks. I believe they were recent returnees from overseas. I hope the Scottish Games on the mainland will do better than we did.

Mrs Robert Massey Died on Dec 29, 2009.



Your **BRA** by Jon Grant

For those reading about DNA testing for the first time...the Y-Chromosome is passed virtually unchanged from a father to his son. The vast majority of the time the father passes an exact copy of his Y-Chromosome to his son. This means that the markers of the son are identical to those of his father. However, on rare occasion there is a mutation or change in one of the markers. Stated another way, and with few exceptions, if your great-great grandfather had four sons and each generation produced four sons, they would all have the same Y-Chromosome markers. If one of these sons acquired a mutation in their markers, that mutation would be passed down to future generations.

As far back as 2003, a handful of Grant genealogists discussed the merits of DNA testing. This new technology was seen as a complementary approach to conventional genealogy. For many of us, we couldn't find the next clue that we needed to extend our research back another generation. In genealogical terms, we hit a brick wall and DNA testing offered us hope of finding others who shared a common ancestor, and the next clue in our research. We agreed that DNA testing was a great resource and the Grant DNA Project officially began in May of 2004.

For anybody who dabbles in technology, you'll understand that technology improves rapidly over increasingly shorter periods of time. DNA testing is no exception. In 2004, we established our standard Y-Chromosome 25 marker test with Family Tree DNA (www.familytreedna.com). As technology improves, Family Tree DNA offers additional testing which serves to refine results for our project members.

We quickly realized that our individual DNA markers meant nothing unless they were compared against a larger database of results. That meant that we needed to recruit others to join us. We periodically post updates on message boards and even hand out flyers at Highland Games around the country. Five years, and 192 people later, we have found a handful of individuals who share a common ancestor with the Clan Grant Chief. We appear to have identified the DNA signature of Matthew Grant's line (which includes President/General Ulysses S. Grant). We have the DNA signature of Peter Grant who was exiled by Oliver Cromwell in 1651 following the Battle of Dunbar. Others have found distant cousins who have been able to provide the clue which attaches lost branches to their respective family trees.

The cost is \$124 for the 25 marker test. Most people who choose to participate are opting for the 37 or 67 marker tests. However, we're sticking with the 25 marker test as our standard because it is in line with our goal of keeping down the costs in order to grow our project membership. Just know that you can always upgrade to another test in the future (without having to provide another DNA sample).

Why Family Tree DNA? Family Tree DNA is the recognized leader in their industry. They were chosen by The National Geographic Society and IBM as a partner in tracing our ancestral origins in the Genographic Project. They have implemented strict controls related to the handling of our DNA samples. I like to remind everyone that this testing is solely for historical and anthropological study. We're simply looking to connect genetic cousins. Family Tree DNA does not share your name and the testing laboratory never sees your name.

NO BLOOD REQUIRED...The Family Tree DNA test kit consists of three swab kits—designed for a single persons use. Each tube contains a fluid designed to arrest bacteria growth, so you can scrape your cheek and return your kit in any type of weather (hot or cold). The freshness of your sample will remain intact for months.

Your kit also includes instructions for collecting your DNA sample (available in many languages) and the all important Release Form. The Release Form is your written consent that allows FTDNA to share your name and email address with someone who matches your genetic fingerprint exactly. Using one cheek scraper, scrape forcefully inside the cheek many times (about 60 seconds). Put the tubes inside the plastic bag that has your kit number and seal it. Insert the plastic bag and the release form in the self-addressed envelope provided, and send it back to Family Tree DNA via US Mail (postage within the US is \$1.22).

Scotish Tribal Link Celebrated

"Digging Up Your Roots" was a BBC Radio Scotland's family history programme that aired at 1200 GMT on Sunday, 10 January, 2010.

An extraordinary link between Scotland and a Native American Indian tribe is set to take centre stage at an International Clan Grant gathering. It is believed that up to a half of the Cherokee Nation could be descendants of Ludovick Grant, who was a laird's son from Creichie in Aberdeenshire. A delegation from the tribe are planning a visit to the Clan Grant International Meeting this summer to discover the roots of their celebrated ancestor.

Ludovick Grant was captured while fighting for the Jacobite army in the battle of Preston in 1715 and was due to be hanged. However, he escaped death and instead was transported to South Carolina, where he was an indentured servant. Following his release from his seven years of servitude, he began working as a trader for the Cherokee people.

According to Marjorie Lowe, a descendent of Ludovick, the fact that he was the son of a Scottish laird would have been meaningless to the Cherokees.

"Many of our Cherokee leaders were descended from this one intermarriage" says Marjorie Lowe Descendent of Ludovick. "Each person was judged on his own merits and they did not recognise any kind of social hierarchy except their matriarchal clan system," she told BBC Radio Scotland's Digging Up Your Roots programme. "So Grant, no doubt, was accepted as a peaceful person who brought trade goods which they desired.

"Since Ludovick lived among the Cherokees for more than thirty years and intermarried we can surmise that he was accepted fully as an adopted Cherokee citizen."

Ludovick met a Cherokee girl known as Eughioote, and according to the Clan Grant, they had a daughter named Mary. Seannachie Adrian Grant said: "Although Ludovick only had the one daughter with his Cherokee wife, nevertheless she went on to be the ancestress of so many Cherokees that a huge proportion - something like a third or a half - of all Cherokees now count Ludovick Grant as one of their ancestors." Ms Lowe added: "Many of our Cherokee leaders were descended from this one intermarriage, others too numerous to mention, would include justices of the Cherokee supreme court and many council members."


However, while creating a legacy with the Cherokees it also appears that Ludovick had left a wife behind in Scotland. The laird's son had married a woman called Margaret Redwood in Edinburgh in 1710 - five years before he was captured and sent abroad.

In 1736 she sought a court order requiring Ludovick to act as a proper husband. This document, known as a Process of Adherence, was viewed as a first stage in seeking a divorce. But Adrian Grant still has some sympathy for Ludovick. "I think it's quite poignant that Margaret's daughter [from a previous marriage] was called Mary, and Ludovick called his own daughter Mary," he said. "So one can't help feeling that he did have some regrets about the situation he found himself in. "But then he was lucky to be alive, he really should have been hanged for his pains."

A Grant Connection in Shropshire: Pitchford Hall

The recorded history of Pitchford, an estate near Shrewsbury, Shropshire, England, can be traced to the time of William the Conqueror. The earliest known proprietor of the estate was Sir Ralph de Pytchford in 1086. His descendants held the property until 1301, when it was sold to Walter de Langton, Bishop of Coventry. During the next two centuries, Pitchford passed to other owners before finally being sold in 1473 to Thomas Ottley, a rich wool merchant from Shrewsbury. Ottley's descendants held the estate for over five hundred years.

The manor house called Pitchford Hall was built in the mid-16th century on the site of an earlier medieval structure. The building is a half-timbered E-shaped country house designated a "Grade I" Listed House of historic and national importance.

One of the manor's many interesting features is a secret chamber, accessed through sliding wooden panels, used by visiting priests when Roman Catholics were being persecuted during the 17th century. Prince Rupert, the nephew of Charles I, also hid from the forces of Oliver Cromwell in the "Priest's Hole" in 1644, while twelve of his bodyguards took cover in a tunnel underneath the manor.

In 1807, the last of the Ottleys died without an heir. Pitchford was conveyed to a distant cousin, the Hon. Charles Cecil Cope Jenkinson, a half-brother of the 2nd Earl of Liverpool. Lord Liverpool became Prime Minister in 1812.

Charles Jenkinson succeeded his brother as the 3rd Earl of Liverpool in 1828, and frequently entertained important guests at Pitchford Hall. In 1832, Princess Victoria stayed at Pitchford for a week. The future Queen referred to the manor in her diary as a "... curious-looking but comfortable house."

Lord Liverpool died in 1851, and his daughter, Louisa Jenkinson, inherited Pitchford. Lady Louisa married John Cotes. After her death, the estate passed to her son, Lt. Col. Charles James Cotes. Colonel Cotes died in 1913, unmarried and almost penniless, having spent all his money on restoring and modernizing Pitchford Hall

The estate then passed to Colonel Cotes' sister, Victoria, who married as her second husband, Lt. Gen. Sir Robert Grant, GCB, a descendant of the Glenurquhart family, the Grants of Sheuglie. After a distinguished career in the Royal Engineers, Sir Robert Grant died in 1904. His son, General Sir Charles John Cecil Grant, inherited Pitchford Hall.

General Sir Charles Grant also had a distinguished career in the Army. He joined the Coldstream Guards and served in the Boer War in South Africa. He was obviously a man of extraordinary administrative skills, serving most of his career as a staff officer. During World War I, he was the principal liaison officer between General Sir Henry Wilson, Chief of the British Imperial General Staff, and French Marshal Ferdinand Foch, Commander in Chief of the Allied Armies. His final posting was Commander in Chief of the Scottish Command and Governor of Edinburgh Castle. While living in retirement at Pitchford Hall, he was honorary colonel of The King's Shropshire Light Infantry. General Sir Charles Grant married Lady Sybil Primrose, daughter of the 5th Earl of Rosebery. Lord Rosebery became Prime Minister in 1894.

Lady Sybil Grant was a great eccentric. She used henna to color her hair bright orange and wore extraordinarily flamboyant clothes. She insisted that Pitchford Hall was haunted and was terrified of the sound of running water. Lady Sybil wrote and published a number of books of fiction and poetry. She was also a philanthropist and donated more than 2,700 volumes to the National Library of Scotland. She rarely ate in the dining room, preferring instead to have her meals brought to her by the butler on a silver salver – sometimes to an enormous tree house on the Pitchford grounds. She was known to shout instructions to her staff from the tree house using a megaphone or "speaking trumpet." Lady Sybil was fond of Gypsies and provided land on her father's estate near Epsom for their use. She and her sister, the Marchioness of Crewe, were both exceedingly wealthy in their own right, but wore the same wedding dress "…in order to economize."

General Sir Charles Grant was an avid angler and expert marksman. He lived in one wing of Pitchford Hall, surrounded by a vast library stocked with books on hunting, fishing, and military matters. Lady Sybil lived in another wing. The two communicated by passing notes throughout the day, carried by the butler and other servants. They frequently met for tea in the afternoon, sometimes served on the lawn when the weather permitted.

In 1935, the Duke of York, later King George VI, and the future Queen Elizabeth, stayed at Pitchford Hall after presenting the "colours" to the 2nd Battalion of The King's Shropshire Light Infantry. Later, during World War II, Pitchford Hall was selected as one of the sites for the evacuation of the royal family in case of a German invasion of the British Isles. Fortunately, this never occurred.

In 1945, Sir Charles Grant matriculated his coat of arms in the Court of the Lord Lyon in Edinburgh, incorporating the arms of the families Grant of Sheuglie, Cotes, Jenkinson and Primrose, as follows:

Quarterly, 1st and 4th, Gules on a fess engrailed between three antique crowns Or a lion passant guardant of the first imperially crowned proper between two cinquefoils of the field (for <u>Grant of Sheuglie</u>), 2nd counter-quartered 1st and 4th ermine 2nd and 3rd paly of six Or and Gules (for <u>Cotes</u>), 3rd Azure a fess wavy Argent charged with a cross pattée Gules in chief two estoiles Or and as an honourable augmentation upon a chief wavy of the second, a cormorant Sable beaked and legged of the third holding in its beak a branch of sea-weed inverted Vert (for <u>Jenkinson</u>, <u>Earl Of Liverpool</u>) Arms accollee with <u>Primrose</u>.

General Sir Charles John Cecil Grant, KCB, KCVO, DSO, died in 1950. For some reason, which has never been made known, Sir Charles and Lady Sybil disinherited their only son, Charles Robert Archibald "Robin" Grant, who was born in 1903. Pitchford Hall was left to the National Library of Wales, to which Sir Charles Grant had already bequeathed the Pitchford and Ottley papers. In a rather ironic reversal, after the death of Lady Sybil, the library relinquished the bequest in favor of Robin Grant in return for a substantial monetary consideration.

Robin Grant married three times. His second wife was Pamela Wellesley, granddaughter of the 4th Duke of Wellington. They had a son, the Rev. Anthony Richard Charles Grant, a Roman Catholic priest, born in 1934. Robin Grant conducted extensive renovations and refurbishment to Pitchford Hall, essentially transforming the structure from an austere manor house into a beautiful, comfortable home.

Upon Robin Grant's death in 1972, the estate passed to his stepdaughter, Caroline Romaine Combe, and her husband, Oliver Colthurst, 2nd son of Sir Richard Colthurst, Baronet. The Colthurst family has held Blarney Castle, and the famous Blarney Stone, in County Cork, Ireland, since the 16th century. Oliver Colthurst was a stockbroker in London, Caroline a fashion editor for *Vogue* and *Harper's Bazaar*.

Regrettably, due to the enormous expenses required to maintain Pitchford Hall and the financial collapse of a subsidiary of the insurance giant Lloyds of London, the Colthursts were forced to sell the estate in 1992. Most of the family's heirlooms, antique furniture, carpets, portraiture and other decorative furnishings collected over a period of five centuries, were liquidated by the London auction house Christie's. Clan Grant heritage made accessible for all

The International Gathering in August will see the launch of CDs containing almost all you need to know about the history of our clan - and more. The current plan is that there will be 2 CDs

CD 1

The first one contains the whole of Sir William Fraser's "Chiefs of Grant"

When this was published only 150 copies were printed.

Now you can buy facsimilies over the internet. To get the lot you would need to buy 6 volumes at around \$35 per volume (and then there is the postage to pay!!!). All in all not much change from \$250 - roughly £175

On the CD you will find images of every page - but far better than just that, the whole of Volume I and the contents and index pages from volumes II and III have been converted into text. By presenting them like web pages it is also very easy to adjust the size of the print to suit any eye - and the computer can search the text for you!!

The CD is, therefore, a snip at just £50.

CD2

The second one is being called "A Clan Grant Compendium" - and so it very much is.

This CD is divided into 4 sections:

<u>Section 1</u> contains all the other Clan Histories we can find which are no longer in copyright. People would find many of these very hard indeed to access - especially, for example, the Birkenburn Manuscript which exists only as a single copy at the National Library of Scotland. But from these you can see how the Grant story has been told down the ages - from 1618 to 1905 (Earl Cassillis' "Rulers of Strathspey"), tracking the changes.

<u>Section 2</u> contains, again in text form, all the entries for the Statistical Accounts of Scotland for Grant parishes. These are available online - but in a very inconvenient format. So this will be a boon to anyone wanting to learn more about the history, geography etc. etc. of any of the "Clan Lands".

Section 3 is called "A Loch Ness Miscellany" containing many books of direct relevance to the Grant holdings around that loch. Included in Rev McKay's "Urqhuart and Glenmoriston" which is on line in an inconvenient form and available in print-on-demand facsimile for around \$35 (c£25). But it also contains two works far more difficult to get hold of: "The Grants of Glenmoriston" by Rev Andrew Sinclair, "The Grants of Corriemony" by Francis Grant WS and there is more.... Section 4 is called "Tales of Strathspey, the Avielochan Collection". This makes available a series of 80+ tales collected by James Grant of Avielochan and published by Landmark Press in 1984 under the title "The Piggy Back and other Tales of Strathspey". We are very lucky to have all the relevant permissions to make this out-of-print work accessible. These stories give an excellent flavour of what life was like in Strathspey 100 and more years ago.

This CD will be offered also at the remarkably affordable price of £50.

After the Gathering these CDs will still be available. Hopefully the next issue of Standfast will explain how they will then be able to be purchased. It should be emphasised that this is no sloppy compilation - considerable care has been taken over presentation - and that in many cases pages images have been included, so that it is possible to check the original if you suspect a typo. Apart from many hundreds of hours of work, it has cost some £1600 to put these works together (mainly the cost of employing a typist and webmasters). Once this sum has been recovered (just 16 sets will do it!!) all residual income will go to the Clan Grant Centre Trust. So when you buy them not only will you have access to a huge body of relevant work without having to clutter up your bookshelves, but you will be making a painless donation to the future of Duthil!!


Pitchford hall - cont

The Colthursts subsequently retired to the village of Beaulieu-sur-Sonnette, Charente, France. Although the displenishment and subsequent liquidation of the Pitchford estate must have been an extraordinarily traumatic experience, Mrs. Colthirst apparently retained at least a remnant of a sense of humor and whimsy. She purchased a used black London taxicab with almost a million miles on the odometer and had it shipped to France. She used the vehicle for short trips to the village and around the nearby countryside – excursions that were no doubt the subject of interesting and amusing anecdotes for the Colthursts, and the locals as well.
